

Mount Washington Cemetery


The Washington Cemetery has expressed there deepest thanks and appreciation for the Associations donation to the cemetery.

ENSIGN O'TOOLE & The USS APPLEBY

From 1962-1964, the USS APPLEBY roamed the peacetime waters of the Pacific Ocean finding its way to such exotic locations as Hong Kong, Korea, the Arctic, San Diego, and, of course, the South Pacific. The crew aboard included a very clever, know-it-all named Ensign O'Toole who was an expert at avoiding work; the very ambitious, but vain LTJG Rex St. John, the ship's supply officer; the cantankerous Chief Petty Officer Homer Nelson, the ship's executive officer LCDR Virgil Stoner who delivered orders from the ship's unseen Captain (only heard over speakers), and a trio of Seamen Gabby DiJulio, Howard Spicer and Claude White.

On a day-to-day basis, O'Toole's duties onboard ship might entail convincing the captain that he's really not "that old," or convincing the crew the CO is not that bad so they will ship-over, or dealing with a foreign admiral who is only 12 years old, or getting a seaman to loose weight before he gets 86ed.

The ship used as the USS APPLEBY was, in reality, the **USS FRANK E. EVANS (DD754)**. It was launched 4 October 1944 and commissioned 3 February 1945. CDR J. E. Feaster, Mike McGuire, and LTJG John Lucas from the EVANS took the television production crew team to sea for a day of shooting for the pilot program. Afterwards, they went to the studio to check the validity of what the set designers had put together. Surprisingly, the pilot house, bridge and CIC were very exact except for one port hole that went in the wrong direction. The EVANS' officer's names were listed as technical advisors on the trailer, but they never got to see their names on the screen as the network broke for a commercial.

Produced by Four Star Productions, the series was based on books "All the Ships at Sea," and "Ensign O'Toole and Me" written by Bill Lederer.

JFK Decommissioned After 38 Years

After a 17 gun salute, USS John F. Kennedy Commanding Officer Capt. Todd Zecchin addressed the more than 5,000 guests, former commanding officers, city officials and distinguished visitors. In his speech, he described his feelings for the ship and the legacy of its crew.

"While preparing for today, I realized that serving on this ship is akin to having a relationship with a tried and true friend," Zecchin said. "Saying goodbye is a sublime melancholy.

"Zecchin described the level of dedication the crew revealed. He illustrated their pride in professionalism in terms of a recent port visit to Boston, when 21 degree below zero wind chills made working conditions at night unforgiving.

None of the watch standers complained. In fact, I had to order them back inside the skin of the ship because they were so intent on getting the job done. "The ship's commanding officer took time not just to remember the crew's efforts, but of those backing each of them. Nobility of purpose, service to people, devotion to a cause and a deep belief in each other is what sustains us. We could not have done it without the support of family and friends," he said.

Commander, U.S. Fleet Forces Command Admiral John B. Nathman talked about the ship's history and the deployments to the Middle East that made headlines in the 1980s, 1990s and the present decade. "You have served with honor and distinction," Nathman said, addressing the crew. "I commend you for facing challenges head-on and for welcoming your responsibility. Feel privileged to bear your responsibility. Wear it as a mantle on your shoulders with the pride it deserves."

June 3, 2007 Memorial Ceremony

Each year on June 3rd several Evans sailor's, wives and friends gather at the Long Beach Memorial to honor our fallen 74. This year Tommy Anthony traveled from his home town in Texas and Richard Burke & Dean Wyse drove 400 miles to attend. The Memorial Ceremony was organized by Pete Peters. This year's memorial was filled with tributes including a fly-by by the Los Angeles US Coast Guard, coordinated by Duane Conely. 74 white Doves flew over the ceremony symbolic of those that we lost on that fate full night of June 3.
