This year around 3 June the Mt. Washington Memorial Cemetery published the death of one of our lost Kenneth W, Glines. Kenny's remains are buried at the Mt. Washington Cemetery in Independence, Missouri.

KENNETH WAYNE GLINES (1950-1969)


Seaman, United States Navy

Before sunrise on the morning of June 3, 1969, the Navy destroyer USS Frank E. Evans (DD 754) was participating in maneuvers with 42 ships from seven nations under the name Exercise Sea Spirit in the South China Sea during the Vietnam War. That day, it was operating in formation with the Royal Navy, the Royal Australian Navy and the Royal New Zealand Navy. This included the aircraft carrier HMAS Melbourne (R 21) of the Royal Australian Navy. By necessity, all ships were running in a darken ship condition. In the darkness and confusion of the moment, the conning officer of the Evans, who had misunderstood a communication from the Melbourne,

turned the destroyer starboard directly into the path of the oncoming carrier. At 3 a.m. the Melbourne struck the Evans, cutting the ship in half. Within three minutes the bow section of the ship sank to the bottom of the sea, taking 73 service members. Of the 74 sailors who lost their lives, only one body was able to be recovered: that of 19-year-old Seaman Kenneth Wayne Glines from Independence, Mo.




The USS Frank E. Evans before it was cut in half by the Australian carrier, HMAS Melbourne SOURCE: GLINES FAMILY ARCHIVES

Seaman Glines had been born in 1950 in Kansas City, Mo. The son of Larry and Wanda Glines and brother of Pamela and Jackie Glines, he was a 1968 graduate of Van Horn High School in Independence. He loved swimming, fishing and football. According to those who knew him, he was the type of person who would do anything for anyone. He died doing just that, in the service of his country.

Kenneth's body was returned home, and he was laid to rest in Mount Washington Cemetery.

Included in this poignant photo from Seaman Glines' funeral is his uncle Chief

Petty Officer Harvey Joseph Glines, who is seen leading the casket to the burial site. He had accompanied the body from overseas to Mount Washington. Also, shown in the background, in the Army uniform, is James R. Chilcutt, a friend and brother-in-law of Kenny's sister Pamela.

To the right of James is Wayne Neece, a high-school friend. To the right of Wayne is Edward Fitzwater, a close family friend. To the right of Edward, barely visible, is John Stover, Kenny Glines' best friend.

As tragic as the circumstances were that cost Seaman Glines his life, the

tragedy did not end there. Nor did it end there for his 73 other shipmates. Nor has it ended, to date, for their survivors.

According to military records the names of the Evans crew killed in the accident are not inscribed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall in Washington, D.C. It was determined that Exercise Sea Spirit was not directly linked with U.S. operations in Vietnam at the time it was

struck. An act of Congress specifically permitting the inclusion of their names on the memorial would be required to add their names, and although legislation has been introduced on several occasions, it has yet (as of May 2017) to gather sufficient support.

Memorials have been erected at other sites, in tribute to the fallen sailors, including one at Mount Washington.

This memorial includes a duplicate of one of the panels from the official Vietnam Memorial wall. On it are inscribed the names of all 74 seamen.

Shortly after Kenny's death, the Glines family received a letter of sympathy from a buddy he had made in boot camp, Larry Webb. In his letter, Seaman Webb referenced the protests of the war that he knew were being held in the States. He placed it all in perspective when he concluded the letter: "What better way would there be to die than in the service of your country for those who live in it. Many people will never know who Kenny was, but to those of us in the Navy who knew him, we are affected very much. To us, his death is just as important as a Medal of Honor recipient in Vietnam. No matter what the conditions, he has died protecting what he believed in, and for all those he loved."

After receiving the letter, Kenny's father, Larry Glines penned his own to

President Nixon and included a copy of Seaman Webb's. He remarked to the president, "This letter helped us a great deal in our time of grief. When you read this letter think of my son and the young sailor who wrote my family, and all the good young men in our country who we seldom hear about ... My son believed in his country as most Americans do and he died for it, as would I."

This replica Vietnam Memorial Wall panel was placed in Mount Washington Cemetery in honor of Seaman Kenneth Wayne Glines and the 73 other seaman who lost their lives aboard the USS Frank E. Evans on June 3, 1969.



MESS COOKING

An anthropologist might call mess cooking a rite of passage... the fate of the lowly non-rated man in the Navy... to be assigned to Mess Cooking. The term is a misnomer. A mess cook A mess cook serves the food, peels the potacooks nothing. toes, does the trays & pots and pans, cleans the mess deck and galley, generally all the dirty work for the cook.

The best job as a mess cook was to be assigned to the CPO mess. The normal assignment was 30 Only after you days. made PO3 did you leave mess cooking behind. remember mess cooking...

I don't remember it too fondly. My whole time was pretty bad... 45 straight, no days off, 0530 to 1800. In port, weekends were light when every one left. Mess cooking 20ft in seas, everyone should try sometime. It gets pretty messy. The worst was a perfect demonstration of projectile vomiting during a storm.

Pepper 4 1/2 tablespoons Stale Bread 300 slices I never got seasick again. If not mess cooking, it was chipping paint. Every day was the worst time!!! I don't think I EVER had a good time doing that crap.

My favorite memory was a couple of particularly nasty pots that weren't coming clean, OVERBOARD..... Another favorite, is the one mess cook that completely filled the dishwasher with liquid detergent, instead of powder, and there were like two feet of suds all throughout the galley...... I never realized the importance to crew morale, as when this First Class left and we got a good, competent one... he walked on water.... Everyman on the crew, from the skipper on down paid homage to his meals, which were excellent, especially underway and chow was the only thing to look forward to. And then, the people...people didn't know how to scrape their plates. They'd toss their trays into the scullery with a half chewed enchilada on their plate...... Nasty...

I remember being a mess cook for, it seems like, three months. My station was in the scullery washing the trays, cups and eating utensils. I would put them in one end of the washer and take them out the other, sort and stack them for reuse. One time we were forced to leave Hong Kong after only one day in port, because of a typhoon. You know how hot and steamy it can get in the scullery? Going into a storm and working in this place was not pleasant. I recall getting the dirty utensils into the washer, running to the sink, THROWING UP, running back to get the dishes coming out of the washer, running back, THROWING UP, and then repeating the process again and again. Crackers and apples were all I could keep down. It was a wonderful experience.... JC Campbell

I was mess cooking. The mess crew slept at the extreme forward part of the ship on the lowest deck. We had one shipmate who was really scared. The rest of us convinced him to write a farewell note home and put it in a bottle. After thinking back on it, I think we were all too young to understand the seriousness of our situation. When we served meals, the Sailors didn't always pay attention so the trays slid off the tables. This made for a big mess to clean after the meal. We served hot meals all during this event except one of cold cuts; it was just too rough. This will always be a major event in my memory... Allan Bostic Article Submitted by Frank Jablonski
