JOHN CALVIN "JC" CAMPBELL 29 JULY 1932 — 30 MARCH 2021

John Calvin "JC" Campbell passed away Tuesday, March 30 2021 surrounded by his loving family. JC lived 32,386 days and he made the best of each and everyone.




JC was born July 29, 1932 in Dallas, Texas, a large city at the time with a population of 266, 500. Today, Dallas boasts a population of 1.4 million. JC was born to John and Mildred Campbell. He joined the Naval Reserve during his senior year of high school at Irving High. He graduated high school in 1950 then in 1951 he volunteered for active duty. He attended Great Lakes Naval Training center for boot camp. On 29 February 1952 he



At the time Evans was homeported in San Diego. The ship was reassigned home ports on 5 November 1952 to Long Beach, California. Most of JC's Navy time was overseas in the far east, mostly duty in Korea. He was classified as a Fireman and worked below the main deck in the fire and engine rooms. Sailors in that classification were called "snipes."

reported onboard USS FRANK E. EVANS DD 754 for duty.

JC was discharged from active duty in October 1953 and he returned to Texas where he attended the Dallas Art Institute. In 1955 he became a student at North Texas State University where he met the love of his life, Sylvia Jenne Carmichael. Sylvia, was a Hood county native and the daughter of county Judge Joseph Carmichael and his wife, Margaret. He often said that when you



see something you want, then you just have to go for it, and he did just that. He also indicated Sylvia was too good for him, so he would just have to get that much better...and that he did! JC also said he was super intimidated by Judge Carmichael so he always stood at attention and was on his best behavior when in presence of "The Judge." JC and Sylvia were married on 19 July 1958, in Granbury Texas at the First Presbyterian Church. The church still stands today in Granbury on Bridge Street. At the time they settled in Haltom City Texas on the north side of Fort Worth. In 1960 they moved with their first son, John Lewis to Granbury. Two more sons were born to them; Jerry Alan and Joel Levin.






Family meant everything to JC, and yes it grew through the years. Unfortunately Sylvia had already passed away when this photo was taken. JC and Sylvia belonged to the First United Methodist Church Granbury for most of their adult lives and recently they became members of the Acton Methodist Church where JC's funeral took place. JC was active at the church and taught Sunday School.

Over the years, JC worked for Southwestern States Telephone, Southwest Aeromotive Company, Convair Aeronautics, Ling-Temco-Vaught and General Dynamics Lockheed Martin from which he retired in 2001. JC was a graphics art illustrator for the schematics components for Lockheed jet fighters. He also was responsible for the fighter books and hand manuals for the B-58 Hustler.

In the last 56 years, JC has served Granbury and Hood county in many capaci-



ties; including Granbury City Council (1971-1982), Granbury Volunteer Fire Department (1971-2021), Granbury Masonic Lodge #392 and the Bluff Dale Lodge #724, Hood County Committee on Aging, and the Advisory Board of the Area Agency on Aging of the North Central Texas Council of Governments.





JC served on the Hood County Development and Advisory Board, the Hood County Hospital District Board, the Transit System Board, and was the member to the Antique Automobile



Club of America and the Lake Granbury Vintage Car Club.


Another love of his life was the USS Frank E. Evans DD 754 Association. JC and one of his good friends, Nick Nichols, started the association in 1992. JC was the President of the Association for 25 years. He presided over 19 reunions, the very first in Grapevine, the second in Granbury and his last in Long Beach, California. He




returned to Long Beach after 66 years when he was a Fireman in the Navy. He told many great stories of the times onboard Evans, he said "it was my home and my shipmates were my family." He organized the Association as a family and it grew in stature as a family, it remains today as one of the most unique Military Ship Associations. Membership grows each year were others have died.




In 1952 off the coast of Korea, the ship held a drawing contest to see who could design the best logo. Their was really no competition, JC's talent was evident when he submitted and won the best entry. The Logo is still displayed and used today. JC never accepted any payment for his art work.
