# POPEYE THE SAILOR MAN REALLY EXISTED

His real name was Frank "Rocky" Fiegel. He was born in 1868 in



Poland and, as a child, immigrated to the United Stats with his parents, who settled down in a small town in Illinois. As a young man, Rocky went to sea. After a 20-year career as a sailor in the Merchant Marines, Fiegel retired. He was later hired by Wiebusch's Tavern in the city of Chester, Illinois as a 'Bouncer' to maintain order in the rowdy bar.

Rocky quickly developed a reputation for always being involved in fighting... and usually winning. As a result, he had a deformed eye ("Pop-eye"). He also always smoked his pipe, so he spoke out of one side of his mouth. In

his spare time as a Bouncer, Rocky would entertain the customers by regaling them with exciting stories of adventures he claimed to have had over his career as a sailor crossing the Seven Seas.

The creator of Popeye, Elzie Segar, grew in Chester and, as a young man, met Rocky at the tavern and would sit for hours listening to the old sailor's amazing sea stories. Years later, Segar became a cartoonist and developed a comic strip called Thimble Theater. He honored Fiegel by asking if he could model his new comic strip character; "Popeye The Sailor Man", after him. Naturally Fiegel was flattered and agreed.

Sefar claimed that other characters in the strip were also based on real people. The character "Olive Oly" was loosely based on Dor Paskel, owner of a small grocery store in Chester. She apparent-

ly looked muck like the "Olive Oly" character in the comics. He claimed she even dressed much the same way.

Through the years, Segar kept in touch with Rocky and always helped him with money; giving him a small percentage of what he earned from his Popeye illustrations.

Who didn't love the cartoons?

We watched them religiously, So Funny, so moral... each story had a good ending.




# YOKOSUKA JAPAN

If you ask any sailor who visited Yokosuka what it is they remember the most, it will be Honcho. Japanese cities are divided into many areas called "chos," and Honcho was the "number one" or main downtown area. The main gate of the Navy Base opened out into Hon-

this cho, and is where the action was. In the 1960s, the streets were lined with many dozens of bars, cabarets and night clubs of just about every description that catered to servicemen. Steve Kraus reports he left his bottle of Seagram's 7 in the California there in 1968, not knowing he would be transferred from the Sterett DLG 31 to the Reeves DlG 24. Mixed in with



these were restaurants, hotels, local shops, pachinko parlors and souvenir stores. As far as sailor towns go it was pretty respectable. Unlike many other places we visited, in Yoko we were safe to indulge in our pleasures with no danger greater than being separated from a few dollars. Yoko was fun!

Each bar had a character of its own, though they all looked pretty much alike. Some played rock'n'roll, others featured country and western, and some had big band and jazz music. Most had dance floors, and all had a bevy of attractive hostesses. All served beer, cocktails and wine, but the liquor and wine were mostly Japanese, and, to be polite, not very palatable. Kirin and Asahi beers were the mainstay. It was the job of the hostesses to make the conversation lively and keep the drinks flowing. In Japan the job of hostess was an acceptable, if not fully respectable, profession. It was part of the "Floating Society" that included bar tenders, artists, musicians and other entertainers, with geisha at the top, the ultimate entertainer. Hostess was the bottom rung of the ladder, available for more private forms of entertainment. But their main job was to keep the sailors happy and spending money.

# USS KIDD UPDATE

# Commander Parina Somnhot Executive Officer, USS KIDD (DDG 100)



"Commander Parina Somnhot was born in Fairfax, Virginia. She studied Print Journalism and International Relations at Boston University, where she received her commission through the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps in 2005.

Commander Somnhot completed her Division Officer tours in USS WASP (LHD 1), where she was assigned to engineering and combat systems departments and USS MOM-SEN (DDG 92), where she served as Fire Control Officer. As a Department Head, Commander Somnhot completed tours as Operations Officer in USS WAYNE E. MEYER (DDG 108) and USS HUÉ CITY (CG 66).

Following her Department Head tours, she commanded USS TY-

PHOON (PC 5) while forward deployed to Manama, Bahrain. She has deployed to every fleet area of operation, supporting Joint Task Force Lebanon and Operations ENDURING FREEDOM, IRAQI FREEDOM and INHERENT RESOLVE. Ashore Commander Somnhot earned a Master of Science in Mechanical Engineering from the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California.

Most recently she served as the Operations Officer on the staff of Commander, Naval Surface Group Western Pacific in Yokosuka, Japan. Commander Somnhot's awards include the Meritorious Service Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, and various unit, service, and campaign awards." As many of you are aware, the chain of command follows a set path. As the Executive Officer of the USS Kidd, she will become the 12th "Captain" or Command Officer of the Kidd sometime in early 2022 which will place her in the ranks in history of being only the second female Commander of the USS Kidd.

# VA PLANS EXPANSION OF BENEFITS FOR DISABILITY CLAIMS FOR CONDITIONS RELATED TO AGENT ORANGE EXPOSURE

The Department of Veterans Affairs announced today a major decision related to presumptive conditions associated with Agent Orange. The VA will begin implementing provisions of the William M. Thornberry National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2021 (Public Law 116-283), adding three conditions to the list of those presumptively associated with exposure to herbicide agents, more commonly known as Agent Orange. Those conditions are bladder cancer, hypothyroidism and Parkinsonism.

"Many of our Nation's Veterans have waited a long time for these benefits," said VA Secretary Denis McDonough. "The VA will not make them wait any longer. This is absolutely the right thing to do for Veterans and their families."

The VA will apply the provisions of court orders related to Nehmer vs. U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs, which may result in an earlier date for entitlement to benefits for Veterans who served in the Republic of Vietnam during the Vietnam War. Vietnam War era Veterans and their survivors, who previously filed and were denied benefits for one of these three new presumptive conditions, will have their cases automatically reviewed without the need to refile a claim. The VA will send letters to impacted Veterans and survivors.
