Ahoy Shipmates, Family & Friends

After the disappointment of our Legislative Bills being dropped in the NDAA last December we finally received some good and hopeful news. Representatives Adam Schiff (D-Calif.), Kelly Armstrong (R-N.D.), and Joe Courtney (D-Conn.) introduced the USS Frank E. Evans Act on 31 May 2023. This is a bipartisan effort to ensure that the names of the "Lost 74" are added to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington D.C.

Representative Kelly Armstrong said "For years, I have been fighting to get the names of the crew members from the USS Frank E. Evans added to the Vietnam War Memorial. We cannot allow bureaucracy to deny them the recognition they deserve. It is long past due to add their names to the Vietnam Veterans Memorial so their fellow service members and loved ones can pay proper tribute to their memories."

She attended Placer High School, graduating in 1961.

When the Evans left Long Beach on March 29, 1969, for another West Pac tour, Bill remained in Long Beach in the hospital due to a broken ankle from an injury playing basketball. He was finally cleared to return to the ship. However, just days away from being transported, the accident occurred. After the collision Bill was assigned to the



USS Mansfield on June 19, 1969. Although he was not involved in the collision, the loss of so many of his shipmates and friends hit him very hard for many years afterward.



Larnce Eugene Ward, known as Gene "Beaver" Ward, 77 years of age, passed on Monday, February 20th, 2023, at his home in Hayden Lake. Gene was born 27 March 1945, in Blackwell, Oklahoma to the late Clara Ward. He was the oldest of four children, two preceded him in death. Gene joined the Navy at 17 and fought in the Vietnam war. Serving on the USS Frank E. Evans.


